BC104: THEOLOGY OF EMOTIONS

I. Course Description

Emotions exist within the Trinity and, therefore, as Image-bearers, emotions exist within us. Massive confusion concerning their significance and place exists within Evangelical Christianity and in world cultures. Emotions are a critical element for the Christian counselor, pastor, and discipler to understand. Emotions are also a major area of struggle in the spiritual life as presented in the Bible. Using emotions as a starting point, we will biblically examine their place in the doctrine of salvation and ecclesiology, and especially their role in spirituality. 2 hours.

III. Reading Levels

There are two levels of reading

A. **Familiarity level:** This level assumes knowledge of the material assigned and leads to accountability in class. (45 pages per hour).

B. **Mastery level**: Reading at this level will average about 20 pages per hour and assumes careful reflective interaction with the ideas, note taking, and will lead to accountability in class, and papers at a mastery level (1000 pages = 50 hours).

These are intended to serve as flexible guidelines or rules of thumb; they are not thought to be rigid. It is certainly understood that books are printed with varying numbers of words per page and written to varying reading levels.

Each assignment **should be completed before the class session that discusses the material** so that you will be able to participate in and benefit from the class discussion.

IV. Written Work

Minimal format standards must be met, as defined below. If the paper is in English, *English grammar and spelling must be up to a standard level. Always include a strong introduction paragraph (declare what you intend to show the reader) and a conclusion paragraph.* Qualities valued include clarity, succinctness, and precision.

- A. 1" margins on top, bottom, and sides
- B. Double-space (= 3 vertical lines per inch, 27 lines per page)
- C. 12-point standard.
- D. Indent paragraphs 5 spaces or 0.6 inches (Thesis standard is 5/8 inch)
- E. No extra line-feed between paragraphs (Format-Paragraph-Space After)
- F. Underline section headings
- G. Staple; no paperclips, folders, or fanfold
- H. Page numbers
- I. A title page is preferred. Any paper sent by email *must* include a title page.

10% of the grades on the typed papers will be Form, that is, conformity to the above standards. (Our purpose is to motivate all Seminary students to present work that consistently looks as good as its content is.)

IX. Assignments

Either do Assignment I or Assignment II:

A. Assignment I: Counselee Handouts and Reflection Studies

Often persons in counseling who are Christians either have a superficial knowledge of the Bible or a nonintegrated knowledge of the Bible. Christian counselors and counselees both need a resource to help them to help the counselee to understand how the Bible addresses their issues and how to integrate these truths into their lives.

Each handout should have a one-page introduction as to what is the nature of the issue being addressed, and what is the portion of Scripture that addresses that issue. The second page will then give an overview of the context of that Scripture. The next two pages will be a guided study asking for answers to questions. The final page will explain how the truths from the study apply to the presenting issues.

This should have these parts:

- 1. What is the presenting issue?
- 2. What is the biblical context addressing that issue?
- 3. What portion of Scripture should be studied?
- 4. What does the person need in order to understand the context?
- 5. What questions will lead the person to understand the context?
- 6. What else does the person need to know from a spiritual and psychological standpoint?
- 7. What is the summary reflection that the person needs to consider?

This material should be one page in length. Then, analyze how significant are these issues in Chapter 5 in a three-page paper. **Due: January 27**
